Boxes of Joy

Each year, we participate in the Boxes of Joy service project. Judy Maurer is the coordinator for the Atlanta Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women. If you are interested in participating, please contact Judy and let her know how many boxes you need. She will leave boxes in the Ministry Closet with your name on them. They come pre-assembled. You will be helping poor children in South America

who might never receive any Christmas gifts. Do not tape your boxes closed. Please just put a rubber band around them. The cost to ship the box is \$9 per box. There is an envelope attached to a flyer for you to put into the box with your check. If you do multiple boxes, you may put just one check in one of the boxes. When the boxes are shipped down to Florida, they are processed to make sure nothing is put into the boxes that is not on the list. Judy shared that she shops at the dollar store to fill her boxes and usually can get \$16-\$20 worth of merchandise into one box. Cross Catholic Outreach puts a small coloring book with how to pray the Rosary in three languages, along with a rosary. That is how we evangelize. NCCW -AACCW -SMMCCW

Sounds like a pot of alphabet soup!

Remember when the women of the church were called the Altar Society, Rosary Ladies or Women's Guild. Some parishes still use those names. So why do we Identify as the Council of Catholic Women? There are several layers to CCW, each having a board of directors, bylaws and governed by Roberts Rules of Order.

Let's start at the top.

NCCW - National Council of Catholic Women was formed in 1920. Yes, we are 103 years old. The U. S. Conference of Catholic Bishops encouraged women to unite, join together and be in solidarity on Catholic women issues.

Their mission statement reads:

The National Council of Catholic Women acts through its members to support, empower, and educate all Catholic women in spirituality, leadership, and service. NCCW programs respond with Gospel values to the needs of the Church and society in the modern world.

Over the years this organization has worn many hats. It has evolved into a working voice for Catholic women. At one time, as many as 6,000 Catholic Women would gather at a convention. NCCW has annual Conventions all over the country open to ALL. This year it was in Salt Lake City, Utah, and next year it will be in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

NCCW represents Catholic women (you and me) not only at USCCB Meetings, as well, represents Catholic women at the United Nations, and the World Union of Catholic Women (WUCWO). NCCW enjoys partnering with many other organization, among them Catholics Relief Services, Cross Catholic Outreach and most recently Catholic Charities. Membership is open to ALL Catholic Women. Members have access to many resources NCCW offers. Check out all platforms of social media FB, Instagram, twitter. Especially the most valuable http://www.NCCW.org. The website is a wealth of resources for personal growth and group programs, including spiritual and service projects.

Connecting women across the USA is done by first creating Provinces. A province director serves on the National Board and network's information to the Archdioceses/Dioceses throughout the country. We are United as Catholic women.

That brings us to

AACCW

In 1957 Atlanta was a diocese and Bishop Francis Hyland formally established the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women.

In 1962 Atlanta was elevated to an Archdiocese and was known as AACCW

(Atlanta Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women.

In 2005 Archbishop (now Cardinal) Wilton Gregory proclaimed that ALL women of the Archdiocese of Atlanta are members of Council of Catholic Women. AACCW shares information received from the Province regarding programs, service projects and spiritual events.

AACCW follows the mission statement, bylaws and structure of NCCW.

The Archdiocese is sectioned into DISTRICTS, very similar to how parishes are divided. There are approx 125 parishes in the Atlanta Archdiocese. There are four districts that meet twice a year. Each district has approximately 25 parishes. SMMCCW is in The Southwest District There are numerous projects AACCW sponsors. Most recognizable is Women of the Year and Youth of the Year. Box of Joy is another project sponsored by AACCW. These projects are extended to the parishes. Some parishes choose not to participate.

In 2011 St Mary Magdalene's Women's Guild voted and chose to identify with Catholic Women around the archdiocese/nation thus becoming SMMCCW. We are proud to be a Council of Catholic Women affiliate and members of the NCCW. It has been through the efforts of several dedicated women of SMMCCW to keep an active group affiliated with the Archdiocese. They attend district meetings to learn of new programs and ideas to share with the women of the parish

At the same time, SMMCCW Circles were formed to give a choice of meeting times, to be inclusive of all women of the parish. Circles are named after saints chosen by the women in the circle. They meet once a month in fellowship with spirituality and service in mind. The circles are small groups of 8-12 women of diverse age coming together to share their friendship and faith. If you are not in a circle and would like to be, contact any board member listed in this newsletter and they will help you. Remember: Where two or more are gathered in my name, there am I. Mathew 18:20.

There is so much more information to add to these different levels of Council. It is most difficult to be concise in sharing my passion for Council of Catholic Women. I welcome any questions. call/text 706-473-8156

Recap of the National Convention for NCCW

What a year it has been so far! We have lost several of our beloved sisters, knowing that they have gone to their Heavenly Father. We will miss them and keep their families in our prayers.

On Tuesday, I got on a plane at 8:00 am and started on a trip to Salt Lake City, Utah for the 103 National Convention for the NCCW. Imagine, 103 years. I had booked a seat on the Salt Lake City Trolley Tour. If you know me well, I love Music, all kinds. We visited Temple Square where the Mormon Tabernacle Choir Performs, it is grand. We had a concert by Andrew Unsworth, one of the 4 full-time organists. It was mesmerizing! The Temple Square Conference Center is more impressive in person than watching their Broadcasts. We visited the State Capital, which used Georgia Marble to build the Center Hallway of the Building. We stopped and looked at some of the other famous homes, the Cathedral of the Madeline. At 12:30 pm we attended a beautiful Awards Luncheon. We had an amazing Speaker/Performer Donna Stoering. We had lots to fill in the afternoon, dinner was on our own. We had a wonderful presentation by our Gold Sponsors, CRS – Catholic Relief Services, Cross Catholic outreach, Holy Cross Family Ministries and We Teach Think.

Thursday, we had the opening of the General Session, the introductions of all the different Commission Chairs, past presidents, Gold Sponsors, Province Director of San Francisco, the DCCW President of the SLC Diocese. We then had a presentation by Krisanne Vaillancourt Murphy, she is executive director of Catholic Mobilizing Network (CMN) the national Catholic Organization to end the death penalty. It was interesting to hear a different side to the story. Our Mass was at 11:45 am, and our principal celebrant and homilist was Most Reverend Oscar A. Solis, D.D. of Salt Lake City. We celebrated our Provinces and had an excellent dinner and then some fun after our pictures were taken. Our Ice Breaker was to guess our nicknames. We laughed about it and remembered them the next day. All in all, a great evening.

Friday, had us down to breakfast at 8:00 am for Breakfast with the Panel. Our panel consisted of Julie Boerio-Goates, Susan Northway, Kimberly Tosti "Our Encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist" It was enlightening as well as thought provoking. Our meeting was called to order at 10:00 am, our opening prayer was offered by Very Reverend Miguel Gonzalez NCCW Chair of the Spiritual Advisors. All the Committee Heads gave their reports.

At 1:30 they held the Purse Auction and made a little over \$12,000. Ask me about this if you want to know what is involved! The reason we made so much this year is because Utah does not allow raffles! We had two presentations, and I was involved in one given by The Leadership Training and Development Team.
